<u>CDC Office and Location</u>: Three research opportunities are currently available with the Office of Minority Health and Health Equity (OMHHE) at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is one of the major operation components of the Department of Health and Human Services. CDC works to protect America from health, safety and security threats, both foreign and in the U.S. Whether diseases start at home or abroad, are chronic or acute, curable or preventable, human error or deliberate attack, CDC fights disease and supports communities and citizens to do the same.

<u>Research Project</u>: Under the guidance of a mentor, the selected participant will have the opportunity to train and gain experience in studies on structural social determinants of health and racism with a focus on public health.

Learning Objectives: These activities may include:

- · Learning to create, update, analyze and manage large datasets
- Training and participating in data science analyses of structural social determinants of health and racism related to morbidity, mortality, and reaching one's full potential using innovative approaches
- Gaining experience writing manuscripts for submission to peer-reviewed journals and government reports
- Producing data visualization of structural social determinants of health and racism data
- · Conducting literature reviews
- Presenting results to internal and external audiences, including professional meetings and/or conferences
- Other related activities as discussed with mentor that further the science base regarding structural social determinants of health, racism and the full potential of the public's health and wellbeing.

<u>Appointment Length</u>: The appointment will initially be for ten months, but may be renewed upon recommendation of CDC and is contingent on the availability of funds.

Level of Participation: The appointment is full-time.

<u>Participant Stipend</u>: The participant will receive a monthly stipend commensurate with educational level and experience.

<u>Citizenship Requirements</u>: This opportunity is available to U.S. citizens, Lawful Permanent Residents (LPR), and foreign nationals.
